- •Commit yourself to a life of following Jesus and serving others.

But changing everything about our lives, denying our human tendencies (think our sinful nature thanks to Adam and Eve), and putting others before ourselves—CAN BE VERY HARD! Satan does a great job trying to distract us from our main purpose in life—sharing the GOOD NEWS.
